Community to vote on \$26 million school budget on May 17

Proposed budget invests in educational opportunities, tax levy increase meets "cap"

On Tuesday, May 17, residents of the Watervliet City School District will vote on a proposed \$26,162,000 budget for the 2016-17 school year. The vote will take place from noon to 9 p.m. at two polling locations in the city: Watervliet Elementary School and the Watervliet Elks Lodge (see page 4 for more information).

The proposed budget increases overall spending 1.04 percent, or \$269,000 more than the current-year budget. The plan maintains all academic programs and provides

The proposal carries a tax levy

The proposal carries a tax levy increase of 0.24 percent—the district's limit as determined by the state's 8-step tax "cap" formula. Because the district meets its tax levy limit, school budget approval will require a simple majority vote (50 percent plus one vote).

With the proposed plan, district officials estimate school taxes would increase \$3 more per \$100,000 of assessed property value in the City

of Watervliet, and \$5 more per \$100,000 of assessed property value in Mannsville. School tax

rates are finalized after the district receives the final tax assessment roll from the city in August. District tax estimates are based on current information.

Watervliet expects to receive \$283,000 more in state aid revenue, a 1.57 percent increase, next year. The increase is comprised of foundation aid, which helps fund the day-to-day costs of operating the school district — and other aid that provides reimbursement for expense-driven costs, such as BOCES services and student transportation, from the year prior.

Investing in education


Increased state aid and anticipated savings in transportation and pension costs, for example, will allow the district to maintain all academic programming next year.


"This is the second year that we are able to present a budget that makes no cuts to programs or staffing," said Superintendent of

Schools Dr. Lori Caplan. "In fact, the 2016-17 budget will allow us to address needs and will help optimize the learning environment."

To that end, the proposed 2016-17 budget will:

 Restore a full-time director of literacy and universal prekindergarten, a position that was eliminated in the 2013-14 budget cycle to help close a budget gap resulting from state aid reductions. The director will oversee the UPK program, provide professional development and support for teachers and reading interventionalists, and will track student progress.

^{*} If the proposed budget is defeated on May 17, the Board of Education will have three options: present the same budget to voters a second time; present a revised budget to voters; or adopt a contingent budget. If the budget is defeated a second time, the board must adopt a contingent budget. Under the tax levy limit law, school districts can levy a tax no greater than that of the prior year, or a 0 percent increase, in a contingent budget. The Watervilet City School District would be required to eliminate an additional \$16,000 in proposed spending for the 2016-2017 school year. This would include a reduction of extracurricular clubs and activities, restrictions on the use of school facilities and grounds by the public, and additional reductions in student supplies, field trips and athletic programs.

The annual budget vote for the fiscal year 2016-2017 by the qualified voters of the Watervliet City School District, Albany County, New York, will be held at two polling locations: Watervliet Elementary School and the Watervliet Elks Club, in said district on Tuesday, May 17, 2016 between the hours of noon and 9:00pm, at which time the polls will be opened to vote by digital voting machine.

- Add 3.5 (FTE) teaching and classroom support
 positions next year to better manage class sizes, and
 address the needs of the district's growing English
 as a New Language (ENL) population, as mandated
 by New York state.
- Introduce a summer enrichment academy for students in grades 5-8 to prevent "summer slide," a loss of skills that often occurs among struggling learners during the summer months.
- Maintain current extracurricular opportunities for students, with the possibility of expanded offerings

contingent on other revenues (e.g., funding from outside sources, such as the Arsenal Partnership and Mohawk Honda).

Fiscal resolve

Although Watervliet is no longer at the top of the list of fiscally-stressed school districts, as it was in 2014, the district still faces moderate fiscal stress, according to a report released by the state comptroller's office in January 2016.

To restore fiscal health, district leaders are budgeting conservatively for the 2016-17 school year. Dr. Caplan also credits teachers, administrators and staff for playing a key role in helping the district be fiscally resilient after consecutive years of state aid losses and rising costs.

"Ours is not a spending problem, it's a revenue problem," Dr. Caplan said. "I thank our teachers and administrators for their efforts to best concentrate the limited resources we have toward preparing students for college and careers. Growing and changing state mandates have required us to do more with less, a trend that has become the norm in our schools; even so, we continue to rise to the challenge for every student, every day."

¹ The basic school tax relief (STAR) exemption is authorized by section 425 of the Real Property Tax Law.

Voting Information

⇒ **You are eligible to vote** if you are a U.S. citizen, at least 18 years old, a resident of the school district for at least 30 days prior to the vote, and have not been convicted of a felony.

⇒ You must be pre-registered to vote. Bring proof of identity to the polls, such as a driver's license or non-driver's ID card. For information on pre-registering, call the business office at 629-3203.
